Information and society. Information literacy, digital literacy, media literacy and data literacy.</p> <p>Unit 2. Information need. Information sources and systems.</p> <p>Unit 3. Information search: strategies and tools.</p> <p>Unit 4. Evaluation of information sources.</p> <p>Unit 5. Organization and retain of information. Bibliographic management tools: RefWorks, EndNote, Mendeley, Zotero.</p> <p>Unit 6. Use of information. Communication and ethical use of information.</p> <p>The Course contains individual assignments for each seminar. Individual assignments are presented and discussed at the seminars. Short reports are presented within the Folder “Assignments” in the virtual learning environment Moodle within each unit.</p> <p>The course contains one main individual assignment:</p>	

	<p>At the beginning of the course each student chooses the topic by his/her own choice (recommended is the topic of student's own research or course work).</p> <p>With completion of weekly assignments, students search, find, and evaluate the relevant information and material on the chosen topic.</p> <p>Using the found research articles and/or other materials students write a short review about newest directions of their research area.</p> <p>The review must be completed by the end of the course, presentation at final seminar (14th December).</p>

Requirements for participating in studies and taking exams/assessments	<p>The final grade in course Information Literacies consists of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ a production of an individual assignment/the result of an individual assignment is review of the topic based on finded materials (50%) ➤ weekly assignments – preparation of short reports based on readings and practical work (25%) ➤ presentation of weekly assignments and contribution to the weekly discussions on the seminars (25%) 	
Requirements for independent work	<p>The course contains individual weekly assingnments based on reading and/or practical work.</p> <p>Main assignment is the outcome of completing weekly assignments. The final outcome is a review of student’s research topic.</p>

(topic chosen by student)“.</p> <p>Completing weekly assignments, presentations and active discussion at the seminars is the presumption of completing main assessment.</p> <p>Criteria of Assessment:</p> <p>„A“ Information is relevant, detailed and accurate; key points are highlighted. A reasonable attempt at using the conventions of academic referencing but some inconsistencies or errors.</p>	

	<p>„D“ Information is presented with some significant gaps and/or errors. Inconsistencies or errors in use of academic referring conventions.</p>

Practical work: reference question, information search</p> <p>November 23rd – <i>Seminar:</i> Information search and finding relevant information (presentations and discussion of the individual assignment). <i>Lecture:</i> Evaluation of information sources.</p> <p>November 30th – <i>Seminar:</i> Evaluation of information sources (presentations and discussion of the individual assignment). <i>Lecture:</i> Organization and retain of information. Bibliographic management tools: RefWorks, EndNote, Mendeley, Zotero.</p> <p>December 7th – <i>Seminar:</i> Organization and retain of information (presentations and discussion of the individual assignment). <i>Lecture:</i> Use of information. Communication and ethical use of information.</p> <p>December 14th – <i>Seminar:</i> Information use and communication (discussion). Presentations of the reviews, discussion. Conclusion of the course.</p>
